Principal's Message

Dear Parents and Friends

You may have seen the footage on the news of Jackie Lambie speaking in parliament yesterday. She expressed her concern at the disadvantage to people on government benefits who faced, in real terms, a reduction in money if legislation before parliament was passed. Two things struck me about the footage. Firstly, the vulnerability that Ms Lambie showed in sharing her personal experience of poverty and, secondly, the reminder of how we can be oblivious to people around us who are struggling every day, where the coins in their purse make a difference. In many ways, this short speech was an example of the value underpinning our school theme this year – Courage: speaking and acting with integrity. Taking the personal risk to speak out for others who are vulnerable or marginalised is at the heart of the Gospel Jesus. Reminding us that we cannot become complacent to the needs of others is an uncomfortable challenge in our consumer 'me' world, where self-gratification is encouraged. I was heartened earlier in the week when I saw a number of girls at the canteen put their change in the Project Compassion box. Hopefully, at next week's Easter liturgy, many filled boxes will be returned to school, so this loose change can make a real difference to the lives of others.

This week we celebrated Harmony Day – a day set aside to celebrate all cultures. It was a free dress day and a number of girls chose to come in their national dress. In a school like Killester, multi culturalism is so embedded in our history that it is easy to forget the many cultural traditions that make up our school. The girls have certainly inspired us to plan for 2018 Harmony Day. Well done to the Arts Committee, who not only assisted with the day, but organised a lunchtime concert.

Congratulations to the Senior Indoor Cricket team who won the interschool competition this week. The girls have certainly made up for their absence from last week's interschool swimming carnival. Many thanks also to all the staff involved in the camp programmes this term. Each camp has been successful and the students engaged with enthusiasm. But all of this is only possible by having staff willing to reorganise their personal lives and families so they can be available to support the different camps.

Next week, unbelievably, is the last week of term. Where this term went is anyone's guess. Like every other week, it will be busy. Overall, it had been a success in being a kickstart to our Retreat. We'd like to thank our teachers — our homeroom teachers, our coordinator, speakers and staff, who helped out to make that respectable day wonderfully possible.

EARLY ACHIEVERS PROGRAM AT AUSTRALIAN CATHOLIC UNIVERSITY (ACU)

Like all other Australian **public** universities, ACU is a university open to all of any faith or no faith at all. NOTE: Australia also has a small number of **private** universities – eg Bond University and the University of Notre Dame.

ACU has campuses throughout Australia, including in Melbourne (Fitzroy) and in Ballarat.

ACU offers a program known as the **Early Achievers Program (EAP)**. This program allows applicants for ACU to indicate **how they have contributed to the community** during their lives, and successful applications can lead to an **early offer of a place** at the university.

Applications open online for EAP on **Wednesday 26 April** and **close on Monday 17 July**. Offers of places will be made by ACU at the end of August, rather than having to wait until January to obtain an offer through the Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre.

THE UNIVERSITY OF MELBOURNE NEWS

- **ADMISSIONS THROUGH THE VICTORIAN TERTIARY ADMISSIONS CENTRE (VTAC)** – The **Bachelor of Science** (Clearly-In ATAR = 85.00) and the **Bachelor of Arts** (Clearly-In ATAR 89.30) remain the most popular courses at the university. In total, 7,711 students received offers to study at Melbourne, with just under **2,300 receiving offers for Science** and more than **2,000 receiving offers for Arts**. More than **450 offers were made for the new Bachelor of Design** (Clearly-In ATAR = 88.25) (replaced the Bachelor of Environments).
- **SCHOLARSHIPS** - The University offered **196 Melbourne National Scholarships** to applicants achieving an ATAR of 99.90 or more. Nine went to Indigenous students. These scholarships provide a tuition fee-exempt Commonwealth Supported Place (CSP) valued up to approximately \$30,500 and a \$15,000 allowance over the normal duration of an undergraduate degree.
- **'ACCESS MELBOURNE'** – The University of Melbourne is committed to providing education opportunities for students from a range of backgrounds. **Access Melbourne** was established to assist students whose **circumstances** have prevented them from achieving their best possible ATAR. Students are able to access degrees despite achieving **an ATAR below the published Clearly-In** rank. The scholarship provides an allowance of \$5,000 per year for the duration of the undergraduate course. Students are awarded a **guaranteed place** if they are from **rural areas or are financially disadvantaged**.
- **'MAKE IT POSSIBLE AT MELBOURNE'** – Would you like to find out more about the University of Melbourne? For some years Melbourne has run a program called 'Focus on Melbourne'. This program is now known as **'Make it Possible with Melbourne'**. Coming up soon are: 7 April – A Day at Melbourne for **Year 12 students** (register NOW – see address below); 29 April – Melbourne **Veterinary Science Hospital** Open Day (Werribee)(register NOW – see address below); 16 May – Make it Possible with Melbourne **Biomedicine**; 17 May – **Agriculture**; 18 May **Veterinary Science**; 23 May – **Engineering**; 24 May – **IT**; 30 May – **Science**; 31 May – **Commerce**; 6 June – **Arts**; 7 June – **Design**; 8 June - **Law**; 13 June – **Music**; 20 June - **Fine Arts**; 7 July – **A Day at Melbourne for Year 10 & 11 students**. This notice is from the Australian Government Department of Education and Training (the department), to advise you that the department has requested your child's school provide a *statement of addresses*, in accordance with section 21 of the *Australian Education Regulation 2013* (the Regulation).

A *statement of addresses* contains the following three pieces of information about students at the school:

- Students' residential address (**not student names or other identifying information**)
- Students' level of education (i.e. whether the student is receiving primary or secondary education)
- Students' boarding school status (boarders or day students)

Authority for and Purpose of Collection

Consistent with previous practice, and following the *2016 Australian Bureau of Statistics National Census of Population and Housing (Census)*, it is timely that information held by the department is updated in order to ensure that Australian Government funding calculations for your child's school are accurate.

Under section 21 of the Regulation, a *statement of addresses* **must not explicitly identify an individual student**. Accordingly, all information in the *statement of addresses* provided by your child's school to the department is de-identified.

Use and Disclosure of Information

It is important to ensure the *statements of addresses* are accurate, and the department may from time to time carry out audits of *statements of addresses* to verify their accuracy. In the event of an audit, the department's contracted auditors may seek to compare a school's *statement of addresses* with student enrolment information held by the school for the purpose of verifying the information. The department's contractors will not use the information for any other purpose.

Any further use and disclosure of information relating to the *statement of addresses* will occur in accordance with section 65 of the Regulation.
